Co-operation with Serbia

Co-operation Agreement was signed by the government of the Republic of Serbia and the Hungarian Charity Service of the Order of Malta. With its experiences and know-how the Hungarian charity organisation supports social programmes primarily in Vojvodina inhabited by Hungarians and provides humanitarian aid to refugees in Serbia. The Agreement was signed in Belgrad by the Under-Secretary, Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs Nenad Ivanisevic as well as Lajos Győri-Dani Managing Director of the Hungarian Charity Service of the Order of Malta on 1 December, 2016.

How to operate a home signalling system?

With the help of the Hungarian Charity Service of the Order of Malta and the financial assistance of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade a home care programme assisted by a signalling system was launched at the Diocesan Caritas in Nagybecskerek, Serbia. The essence of the system which has been working in Hungary for decades is that seniors, if they don't feel well or are in trouble, can ask for help pushing a button on a device worn on their wrist. The signal is received in a dispatcher centre which organises the assistance. Twenty old people were involved in this pilot programme between April and November 2016.

Homeless people's pilgrimage

The Hungarian Charity Service of the Order of Malta organised a trip to the Vatican for a group of pilgrims consisting of homeless people from Budapest and their accompanying helpers to meet Pope Francis at a special audience. The Holy Father received the group in the Pope Paul VI audience hall on Saint Martin's Day, 11 November. When Pope Francis entered and arrived to the hungarian group the pilgrims greeted him shouting "Isten éltesse!" The Pope stopped for a moment, blessed the group, a some people had a chance to shake hands with him. Never ever stop dreaming - said Pope Francis the crowd. "Life will be nice again. The ability to see what is beautiful even in the deepest sorrow and misery gives dignity to all men and women."



Not a single homeless will be refused by the institutions of the Charity Service of the Order of Malta due to shortage of capacity promised the organisation at the beginning of the crisis period.

With the arrival of the chilly days hundreds of homeless who earlier refused the services of institutions now accepted assistance. The Charity Service started temporary shelters in the most critical winter period, even the meeting room of the National Centre was opened for homeless people. In the coldest weeks nine ambulances of the Charity Service were in action to save lives of people lying on the streets of Budapest, while the person on duty of the Service received sixty emergency calls a day.





As a member of a group of sixteen the Hungarian Charity Service of the Order of Malta organised the trip to Liechtenstein for the four thousandth needy child. The grand duchess of the microstate in the Alps welcomes groups from Eastern-Europe organised by the charity organisation for three-week holiday. The history of the invitation goes back to 1991, when Grand Duchess Marie of Liechtenstein staying in Budapest was informed on the activities of the Charity Service and decided to welcome orphaned children of victims of the Romanian revolution and the Yugoslav wars for three-week holiday in Liechtenstein. The Charity Service of the Order of Malta was invited to organise the groups and make travel arrangement. Following the orphan children of needy families were also welcome in the home operated by the Red Cross of Liechtenstein, the costs are covered by the hosts.

288 tOINS of donation Adni The "Giving is a joy!" food donation campaign of the Hungarian Charity Service of the Order of Malta was more successful than ever this year. In the frame of the Christmas donation collection more than 2500 volunteers asked people in 165 Spar Supermarkets to donate as they can afford durable food for the indigent.
